Here were the region's top 10:
1. Clinton Township, in Macomb County's second tier of communities north of Detroit, led the pack by issuing permits for 703 new residences, more than half multiples.

2. Canton Township, in Wayne

County's third range of townships west of Detroit, moved into second place from fifth with 659 units, of which just 161 were multiples.

3. Shelby Township, in Maccomb's third tier, permitted 676 units, nearly half or multiples. It stayed in third place in the region.

4. Troy, in eastern Oakland County, moved to fourth place from seventh with permits for 512 units, mostly single-family houses.
