Exchange rates notice: Group marks 70 years

Any birthday cake for the Farmington Exchange would have to be large enough to hold 70 candles — the local service club entered its seventh decade this year.

The service club, formed by business members to "exchange" ideas has a new president — Jody Soronen, executive director of the Farmington Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce.

Soronen made history along with Joy Schmidt, president of Joy Schmidt Association, in Farmington Hills, in 1987 when they became the first women members admitted to the local club.

Soronen is the club's first woman president.

"I never gave it a second thought (about joining)," said Soronen, who added that she felt immediately comfortable. It seemed only natural because previous chamber directors had been members.

The National Exchange Club had its beginnings around the turn of the century when several businessmen, jewelry manufacturer Charles A. Berkey among them, decided to meet once a week for brainstorming sessions and to exchange ideas.

The Detroit club joined three similar organizations from Michigan and Ohio to form the National Exchange in Toledo with Berkey as its founder.

The Farmington club, which started in 1924 with a luncheon in the director's room of the old Farmington State Savings Bank, has close ties with the national organization.

One of Berkey's sons, Reed Berkey, was a member of the Farmington Exchange until his death a few years ago.

Like many service clubs, the Exchange Club did not allow women to be members until the 1980s. The national club voted to admit women at its national convention in July 1985.

The club's main charitable objective is the prevention of child



abuse and much of the funds come from the club's annual benefit golf outing. Canisters provide a way for year-round collections.

"We raise about \$8,000 a year," said Jim Stevens, a Century 21 Realtor and the club's historian.

The Farmington Goodfellows started as part of the Exchange Club.

Member Bob Rock is the organizer for the Exchange Club parade to the Farmington Memorial Day Parade called "GIVEAKIDAFLAGTOWAVE." Club members walked the parade route at the beginning of the parade to hand out flags to the young and the young at heart.

"We gave out 1,500 flags this year," Stevens said.

The club's Wednesday meeting place has been changed from the Farmington Elks Club to Brass Point Food & Spirits restaurant on Orchard Lake Road north of 10 Mile. Meetings start at noon.
