The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills will hold a Public Hearing at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, June 13, 1994 in the City Council Chambers at City Hall, 13, 1994 in the City Council Chambers at City Hall, 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, on the levying, in 1994, of a proposed increase of \$.3279 per \$1,000 SEV) over the base tax rate for storm drain construction and debt, the acquisition of property and other capital improvements as well as increased library funding and operating costs, including additional public safety personnel, pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan 1982 and on the proposed 1904-95 Funders 1994-95 Budgets.

If adopted, the proposed additional millage would increase revenues from ad valorem property taxes in 1994 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982, by approximately 3.89% over the 1993 base tax rate of \$8.4093 Mills. The City presently is authorized to levy \$9.1220 Mills for operating purposes and parks capital improvements.

The miliage rate increase results from adjustments to the 1993 tax levy of \$.2519 Mills to make up for required rollbacks and \$.0760 Mill increase to balance recommended budgets as follows:

Drains and Drain Debt (Roll up to \$.6000 Mills)
Parks (Roll up to \$.5000 Mills)
Added Public Safety Personnel .0117 .0162 .0948 Library Funding Operating Costs 1483

The recommendation for 1994-95 levy is \$8.2372 Mills (\$8.2372 per \$1,000 SEV) for operating and capital improvement purposes. The \$.5000 per \$1,000 SEV), approved by the voters on May 7, 1991 for Parks and Recreation Capital Improvements, will also be levied in addition to \$.4037 Mill (\$.4037 per \$1,000 SEV) for exempt debt. The amounts actually levied during the past several years are listed below:
