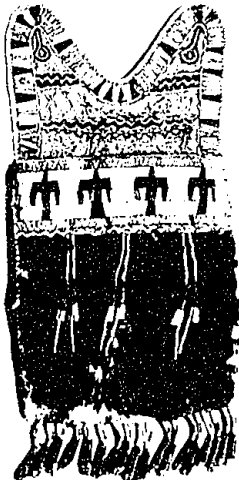

Memory finds cultural exchange

When the Americans landed in Normandy on June 6, 1944, to liberate France and the rest of Europe from Nazi Germany, the event made a lasting impact on a young boy born and raised in Normandy.

Julien Ermiase was so impressed with what the Americans had done for France that it became a permanent part of his memory and helped to shape his life's work in intercultural exchange.

In 1967, Ermiase founded Nacel Cultural Exchanges, which has since become the largest cultural exchange organization between France and the United States.

Specializing in summer home-

stay programs, Nacel arranged over 16,000 exchanges last year alone, with the biggest program between America and France.

This summer, more than 4,000 French teens will be welcomed into American homes and nearly 1,000 American teens will live with French families through the Nacel programs.

This anniversary means as much to Ermiase as it does to the soldiers who fought in the war.

"The first Americans I ever met were soldiers and liberators. As we watched them pass through a German-occupied village in Normandy, we were dazzled, moved and very grateful," said Ermiase in a Nacel press release. "We

shared cries of joy and applause. I will never forget."

Every year on June 6, Ermiase has written at the end of his letter, fax, or telex to the American Nacel Office, "I remember!" Ermiase retired last year, but his dreams of friendship between the two countries have not died.

Today, Michigan families can celebrate the 50th anniversary of D-Day and help to continue Ermiase's dream by hosting one of the 180 French students coming here for a four- or seven-week visit starting July 6 or 29. These teen-agers speak English, bring their own spending money, and are covered by insurance. The students are accompanied by

chaperones who also stay with area families and, together with the Michigan local representatives, provide a support network.

Many homes are still needed for these teen-agers who dream of experiencing life in Michigan.

Nacel Cultural Exchanges is a non-profit organization that has been successfully matching students to families for more than 35 years. Today Nacel also offers home-stay programs with Spain, Germany, Mexico and the Ivory Coast of Africa. 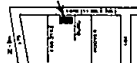
