"Now I hear you're willing to meet us halfway." Kelmendi said Tuesday. "Until now, we have not heard anything of the sort."



Inch: "During the first year, 94-95, the effect appears to be a wash compared to the peast funding systems. We will be getting the money from the state rather than from local taxes.
