four plastic bags containing a total of 24.6 grams of marijuana.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

Farmington Hills arrested a Dearborn Heights man, 32, for driving under the influence of alcohol June 4. The man was driving his 1983 Toyota Celica south on Orchard Lake from 12 Mile in two lanes and then turned east on 11 Mile. He pulled over to the shoulder three different times when police put on the overhead lights, but then pulled off the shoulder and continued, finally turning onto southbound Westmoreland before stopping. The man took a preliminary breath test that indicated a blood alcohol level of .22 percent. A level of .1 percent or above is considered too intoxicated to drive.

Farmington Hills police arrested a Livonia man, 21, for drunken driving on June 4. The man was driving a 1994 green Chevy pickup north on I-275 north of Nine Mile when Farmington Hills police saw him drive into a ditch. A breath test showed a blood alcohol level of .17 percent.

Farmington Hills police arrested a Mikado man, 21, for driving under the influence and driving with open intoxicants on eastbound M-5 (formerly M-102) in Farmington Hills June 5. Police said the man was driving his blue and white Ford Bronco east on M-5 east of Orchard Lake and had driven across the median going at about 75 mph. The man had a blood alcohol level of .13 percent. Police arrested a Farmington Hills man, 33, for driving while intoxicated June 6 on eastbound Shiloh near Middlebelt. The man was driving 60-65 mph in a 35 mph zone when officers pulled him over. His blood alcohol level was .13 percent.

Also on June 6, Farmington Hills police arrested a Southfield man, 21, for driving under the influence of alcohol and had to take him to Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills because the man was sick. The man had been driving his red 1991 Ford Tempo at 75-80 mph north on Northwest between Inkster and Shrewsbury.

bury at 11:40 p.m. when police pulled him over. He showed a Michigan ID card instead of a license and had a blood alcohol level of .17 percent. The man complained of being sick and was taken to Botsford where he was diagnosed as suffering from the effects of alcohol combined with stomach flu.

FIRES

Farmington Hills firefighters from stations 2 and 4 responded to a basement fire that started near the water heater at a residence on Old Timber at 2:44 p.m. May 27. The fire was extinguished when a copper hot water joint ruptured. Damage to the property is estimated at \$15,000 and damage to contents was \$2,500.

Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 3 put out a grass fire along Grayfield at Middlebelt at 6:39 p.m. June 4. There was no serious damage.

Farmington Hills police put out a truck fire in a UMCD Aeroma that had been traveling north on Orchard Lake south of 13 Mile at 3:44 p.m. June 5. The truck had backfired, causing the engine compartment to catch fire. Police put out the fire with dry chemical extinguishers. Damage was \$1,000 to the truck.

Grease from bacon caught fire and damaged a kitchen in a house on Willowbrook in Farmington Hills at 7:37 p.m. June 3. Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 1 helped clear smoke after the homeowner had extinguished the fire. The fire started after the woman had taken bacon that had been cooking in the oven and put it on top of the stove, unaware that a burner was on. Grease from the bacon then caught fire. Damage is estimated at \$5,000 to contents.

Firefighters from Station 1 in Farmington Hills assisted a resident in putting out a grass fire at the Green Hill Apartments on Green Hill in Farmington Hills at 5:22 p.m. June 3. Cigarette butts appeared to have combined with the dry conditions to start the fire. There was no serious damage.

Aug. 1 pre-exam set in rape case

A Farmington Hills man accused of sexually assaulting a 17-year-old pleaded innocent at his arraignment in Oakland County Circuit Court Monday.

Christian Tompson entered the plea before Judge Denise Langford Morris. A preliminary examination in the case is set for 1:30 p.m. Aug. 1.

Tompson, 28, is accused of getting the teen-age daughter of a co-worker and former friend drunk and then forcibly raping her. He faces up to 15 years in prison on a

charge of third degree criminal sexual conduct and up to 90 days in jail for furnishing alcohol to a minor. The alleged incident took place on March 31.

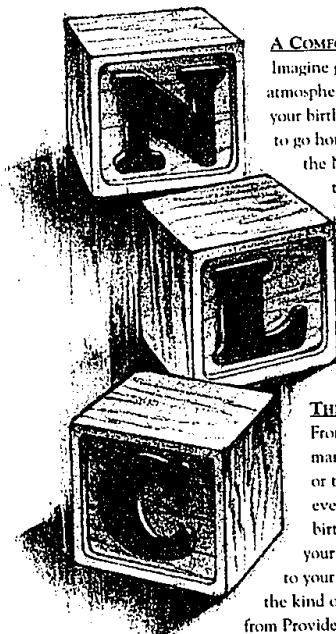

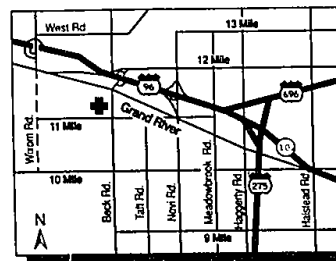
