"I can't be unhappy. We were 6-1 last year. We were down 6-1 and the next two, and we could still be playing. It's still a game of inches at this level."

Marian played without junior leafoff batter Steve Michalski, who was taken to the hospital after the first game to be examined for a possible concussion. She slid into the knee of a Central player in the first inning but was able to play through the sixth inning.
