If you are one of those people who has a knack for coming up with a creative, clever name the Michigan Department of Natural Resources needs your help.

Three persprine falcon chicks—two males and one female—were born around Mother's Day in a nest high atop the Book Building in Detroit. The significance of the chicks is that they are the first known batchlings, in 1994 out of six peregrine nesting sights in Michigan.

The activities of these birds have generated a tremendous public awareness of wildlife in an urban area," said Ray Rustem,

supervisor of the DNR's Natural Heritage Program. "We want to give this naming opportunity to the public as our way of thanking them for their interest."

The names will be selected by a committee of people appointed by the DNR and will be announced in July.


