By a 5 to 1 vote (with one ab-atention), the OCC board of trus-tees recently decided to go to the voters early next year to ask them to increase property taxes for the school above the current 1-mill

levy.

Details — such as the amount
of the increase to be requested
and the date of the election in
1995 — are yet to be worked out.

"This should have been done
10 years ago," said trustee Richard A. Blonde, who voted with the

majority to seek the tax hike. Voting with him for the hike were
trustees David W. Hackett of Rotester Hills, Janies Simmons of
Rochester Hills, Janie Simmons of
Royal Oak and Judith Wiser of
West Bloomfield.
Trustee Douglas Wakefield of
Southfield abstained, and Sandra
Ritter of Watefrord voted no. "I
think this decision should be
made with the new board members," she explained.

Blonde and Hackett both lost

bids for re-election in last Mon-day's OCC election, and will be replaced next month by Carol L. Crew of Waterford and Pamala M. Davis of Clawson.

The board voted in favor of seeking the millings hike after hearing a report on a poll to deter-mine how likely voters would re-spond. That poll indicated that 43 percent of those responding would vote no, scording to Dan-iel A. Jaksen, vice chancellor for planning and development. Thir-

ty-one percent said they would vote yes.

Those numbers aren't as bad as they might seem, said Jaksen. For one thing, 26 percent of those re-sponding said they were undecid-ed.

ed. Furthermore the poll — con-ducted internally and validated by Public Sector Consultants in East Lansing — pointed to other factors that seem to favor a suc-cessful millage campaign, Jaksen said.

One of those factors, he said, is those responding are not necessarily opposed to OCC or its programs. Much of the opposition is related to a general anti-tar at mosphere among voters.

Chancellor Patsy Fulton agreed, and she said OCC has ample ammunition for a full-scale educational campaign. "We've cut corners and we've increased efficiency," she said. "But we need additional money. I believe voters will realize that."
