Detroit's own Screwface, after only about one year together, has defly warded off both of these evils with its debut release, "Whatever." There are two curses com-

Band members Clay Brown, Steve Wisner and Brian Foley run the gamut of contemporary grungs/metal in this cohesive compilation of 10 tunes.

The Screwface sound is dark and heavy without sinking to the lugubrious, while the lyrics often display a subtle black humor. "Whatever" opens with the sledgehammer rift of "Nieedle" and closes with the uncompromising threath of "Porno Movie" and "M.D.Y.M."

In between, Screwface conjures the spirits of Primus, Soundgarden and Tool. The instrumental "Cat Daddy" tips its hat to the Eric Gales Band with a punchy punk funk groove.

The one change Screwface might want to make would be to add a lead vocalist to the line-up, Guttrist Clay Brown currently covers most of the vocal chores, and he's not bed at all, but the musi-demship and arrangements deserve vocals of the same superior caliber.
