life-threatening diseases.

"They were just wonderful to us," Diane said with tears in her eyes. "We had been through some very difficult months. And we were meeting families who were in all liliferent phases" of illness and recovery.

Rainbow Connection, based in Rochester, provided the trip along with the Give Kids the World organization, which only charges 300 for the five-night and six-day stay in a fantasy world where this are retasted like royalty.

Families are met at the airport, given a rental car and provided with tickets to Dianey World and all the thems parts in the arsa. Rainbow Connection also pays the airfare, airport limousine rides, and spending money for the family. Children at Kids Village wear special buttons that mean they don't have to wait in lines, and the animated characters shower them with special sitemation, the set of smills of the set of the se

"I've had families call and say." I don't want to leave," said Su-sanne Jones, Rainbow Connec-tion executive director.
Rainbow Connection, founded in 1885 by L. Broots Patterson, grants shout 100 wishes annually to chronic and gravely ill young-sters. They do this through dona-tions from individuals and corpo-rations. Farmer Jack Supermar-kets and participating vendors recently became a corporate spon-sor.

"Some of our children don't beat their illnesses, like John, who was dying of cancer," Jones said. "He wanted to see 'Saturday Night Live' taped." At his funeral, the family had a collage titled: "The beat of our last times," and the pictures showed the family's trip to New York.
