Video gives tips to Medicare recipients

The Michigan Peer Review Organization contracts with the Health Care Financing Administration to oversee the quality of medical care given to Medicare beneficiaries in Michigan.

MPRO has just completed the production of a video program that encourages Medicare beneficiaries to be informed consumers of health care, talking openly with their physicians, and with hospital personnel as questions arise when they are hospitalized.

It instructs them about their appeal rights and how to activate them when they feel they are being asked to leave the hospital

too soon.

Although this information is available in the Medicare Handbook, it is often overlocked by the few who even take the time to read it.

The video has a 12-minute running time.

In an effort to improve Michigan's childhood immunisation rate, the Michigan Hospital Association recently released a bulletin saking beepitals statewide to volunteer as immunisation sites.
