Municipalities still tapping into water-use restrictions

Outdoor watering restrictions drip on in the Farmington area, at least until the end of the month.

Detroit Water and Sewerage Department has decided to restrict outside use through July 31, maintaining the odd/even schedule instituted in June.
For example, residents who live at an even-numbered address may only water their lawns on an even-numbered aleindar day. The same applies for residents at odd-numbered addresses on odd-numbered addresses on odd-numbered calendar days.
