

Raffle organizers: People auto buy tickets

Fantasy Car Raffle ticket buyers will get something extra this year when they spend \$100 for the one-in-100 chance at a shiny, new Corvette or \$30,000 cash, or one of nine other prizes.

The perk? Two tickets to a Founders Festival Extravaganza Party held exclusively for raffle ticket purchasers.

The Extravaganza Party to be held Saturday, July 16, is the culmination of long hours of work and planning by a festival committee given the task of drumming up additional dollars and interest to support the Founders Festival effort.

The group has primarily focused its fund-raising effort on beefing up interest in the Chamber's Fantasy Car Raffle. Unlike years past, the committee has organized a private party especially for raffle ticket purchasers.

The Extravaganza is designed to give ticket buyers added value. According to Paula Masturka, a committee member, each \$100 ticket buys the traditional chance at one of 10 prizes, plus two tickets to the Extravaganza Party which takes place from 7-11 p.m. behind the former Ray Interiors, at 33000 Slocum, Farmington.

Partygoers will enjoy dancing to '60s, '70s, '80s and '90s rock 'n' roll music performed by Bobby Lewis and The Cracker Jack Band as well as a cash bar and finger foods available from local food concessions. The evening reaches its climax at 11 p.m. when the winners of the raffle will be announced.

To date, ticket sales are consistent with those of last year's sales — which represented the raffle's banner year of 818 tickets sold out of the available 1,000. "We're gearing for a sellout," said Masturka. "Everyone's added ef-

forts and The Extravaganza party are sure to make a difference."

According to Jody Soronen, executive director of the Farmington/Farmington Hills Chamber of Commerce, many purchase raffle tickets as a gesture of support for the Founders Festival.

"People know the festival is good for the community and that we rely heavily on the raffle to help meet the event's operating expenses."

Committee member Mike Paulson agrees. "The raffle goes beyond supporting the festival, as does the philosophy behind The Extravaganza party. Our aim is to get people involved in an event that supports the growth and perceptions of the community as well as the businesses within it."

"Because the Founders Festival is one of the largest and most established community events in the area, it's a logical vehicle for garnering local participation."

According to Masturka, this year's festival has added incentive for ticket buyers by "warming the pot." "We've added more prizes this year so the odds of winning are one out of 100 — providing we have a sellout," she said.

This year's grand prize winner will drive away with a 1994 Corvette or walk away with a \$30,000 cash purse. Other prizes include one \$1,000 shopping spree, three \$500 shopping sprees, three \$250 shopping sprees and two \$150 shopping sprees.

Tickets may be bought at the Farmington/Farmington Hills

Chamber of Commerce in the Farmington Training Center at 33000 Thomas, one block north of Grand River and two blocks east of Farmington Road.

Other ticket outlets include Ginopolls on the Grill, Botaford Inn, Hearts and Roses, Holiday Chevrolet, Huntington Bank, Infinity of Farmington Hills, Lex, Stock and Barrel Deli and Metro-bank. In addition to cash and checks, Visa and Mastercard will also be accepted as payment for raffle tickets.

Ticket holders need not be present at the drawing to win. To claim the car, the grand prize winner must be at least 21 years of age. Applicable taxes, registration and title fees are also the responsibility of the winner. Call the chamber at 474-5440 for more information.






