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Residents had come in force to planning commission meetings, a joint city council/planning commission session and the June 20 city council meeting to oppose it, with little effect, Stein said.

"We feel we've been ignored," she said, adding that if necessary, residents would put an initiative or referendum on the ballot to kill the project.

But city attorney John Donohue said the law was not clear if such a referendum would stand up to a legal challenge.

Stein said including an 8,000-square-foot restaurant, which would be some 2,300 square feet larger than a nearby Ruby Tuesday, wasn't acceptable.

The council used a "crisis" mentality when it approved the project, said Brad Bement of Brookhill Estates.

"The council seemed to be saying, 'We like this developer and if we don't approve this, we may get something we don't want,'" Bement said. "You've hinted at a crisis that doesn't exist."

No resident spoke in favor of

the project and applause came after speakers made their case against it.

Increased traffic and the inclusion of another commercial development while other shopping centers are having a tough time were two of the themes residents spoke on.

"We will not disappear," said Saul Roasman, adding that a recall of council members who voted for the project was a possibility.

Betty Lurie of Holly Hills Farms said the project would create "another Orchard Lake Road," with a glut of traffic that would lower property values.

Councilman Terry Sever said he had not seen as intense a response to any issue during his tenure on the council.

"This is one of the most determined groups I've seen in my 10 years on council," he said.

The council will meet with residents and Janna to try and work out a compromise plan to bring back for a vote at the Aug. 16 regular meeting.

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
