Residents had come in force to planning commission meetings, a joint city council/planning com-mission session and the June 20 city council meeting to oppose it, with little effect, Stein said. "We feel we've been ignored," she said, adding that if necessary, residents would put an initiative or referendum on the ballot to kill the moder."

But city attorney John Donobue said the law was not clear if such a referendum would stand up to a legal challenge.

Stein said including an 8,000 square feet larger than a nearby Ruby Tuesday, wasn't acceptable.

The council used a "crisis" mentality when it approved the project, said Brud Bement of Brookhill Estates.

"The council seemed to be saying, We like this developer and if we don't approve this, we may get something we don't want."

Bement said. "You've hinted at a crisis that deem't exist."
