OTTO H. REGENTIK

Mr. Regentik, 79, of Farmington Hills died June 25 in Botaford Hospital, Farmington Hills. Mr. Regentik was the former owner-operator of Grandview Orchards in Novi. He was born on the family farm on Howard Road in what was then Farmington Township. His parents' home was believed to be the first in the area to have electricity. Because there were no power lines, they had a power plant in the basement. He attended a one-room schoolhouse at 12 Mile and Haled Road and then obtained a driver's license at the age of 14 so that he could attend high school in the city of Farmington as there was no bus service at that time.

As an adult, Mr. Regentik became sole operator of the family orchards after his father died and his brother moved to California. While continuing to operate the orchards, he branched out into the retail side of the business, purchasing Grandview Orchards on Grand River in Novi. After the family orchards were sold, he continued to operate the retail business until he retired at the age of 66. In his early 70s, he found that he missed working. He went to work delivering flowers for the Farmington Florist.

Survivors include his wife, Elizabeth; daughter, Lisa Higgins; son, Robert; sister, Olga; brother, Vlady; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild. Services were at the Heeneys-Sundquist Funeral Home, Farmington, with the Rev. Fred Froman officiating. Burial was in Oakland Hills Cemetery, Novi.
