The game last Saturday evening between the Try Squares and Farmington I in the town hall was fast and interesting. The final score, 54 to 32, in favor of Farmington I was quite a surprise to the Try Squares, who came here confident of winning.

The High School team of Farmington won a victory over the Wyandotte High team in Wyandotte last Saturday evening, the score being 16 to 18. This victory is a splendid one and the High school team is to be commended for their excellent work.

Last Friday evening Farmington I traveled to Pontiac to play Pontiac Reserves, but really had to face the 1st team, and defeated them to the best score of 15 to 27.

Another game was played in Pontiac Tuesday evening with the 1st Pontiac high team. The score was 22 to 27 in favor of Pontiac. Our boys had the best of the play and the biggest score within five minutes of time, when Pontiac got away and won.

Last Monday the fast Redford team came here to play the High school team. The latter won by good team work, the score being 54 to 9.

Do you favor the confirmation of the franchise granted by the Village Council on February 6, 1911, to Eastern Michigan Edison Company, granting permission to erect, construct, lay, operate and maintain within the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places within the Village of Farmington, poles, wires, pipes, conduits and other apparatus for the transmission and distribution of electricity for public and private use.
