She walked the first batter of the game, Melissa Petrosky, and she reached second base—which was as far as any Niner baserunner advanced.

And no others got a free pass, either; it was the only walk issued by Nicastri.

The final play of the game summed up Northville's fortune. Jenny Frisbie singled with two out, the second hit of the game for the American Division champions (they finished 12-6)—and then she was caught off base as she rounded first.

"We've been playing good ball, we have some good athletes," said Ar-

nold after the victory, which allowed the Netional Division champion Co-bras to finish their Incredible season with a 18-2 record. "We played quite a few ballgames this year, and we played in a couple of good tourna-ments."
