

Sounding at times more like they were running against Presi-dent Bill Clinton than election statewide offices, area Republi-cans pledged their unity at a morning-after breakfast Wednes-day at the Embass Suites Hotel in Southfield. That kind of unity will appar-ently be reflected in at least one GOP family, formerly of Birming-ham.
