Harrison is strongest at the offensive skill positions with the return of seniors Nick Williams and Kevin Bryant — both Division I prospects—and junior Jason Granger, All were first-team All-WillaA players.

The outlook would have been even brighter if Harrison had a basilhy Scott Gurke. The senior running back was granted an extra semester after suffering a knee injury last year, but he injured the other knee five weeks ago in a summer peasing league.
