She was a troubleshooter. He
helpful voice had a way of assuaging their anger and deflating their

Often, when the conversation ended, callers found they didn't need to speak with the person in charge.

"She had the empathy," said Cowan, May's boss for more than a year, "She had the knowledge and understanding in her person-ality and speech that they trusted her."

May, a Livonia resident, died Aug. 8 from complications be-lieved to have stemmed from a

bout with hepatitis 15 years ago. She celebrated her 33th birthday Aug. 1. She is survived by her husband, Gary; two daughters, Carrie, 20, and Celleen, 18; and one grand-child.

May worked with the Farming-May worked with the Farming-ton schools for nine years, start-ing out as a paraprofessional at Boys Republic, a school for delin-quent youths. Her husband re-calls her often coming home after a rough encounter with the trou-bled residents, exclaiming, "Boy, what a great day!"

"She didn't overreact to their aggressive and violent nature," Alternative Education Principal William Miller said. "She was able to handle it on an even keel and with warmth. The kids respected her for that. The kids loved her."

When Boys Republic downsized staff, May took a central office position.

May helped organize the district's microfilm area and later worked in the accounting department.

May moved to Building and Student Services as a socretary. She didn't know shorthand, but took a specdwriting course and cajoled her boss into using a dic-
