In Livingston and Washtenaw counties, Columbia Cable charges 40 centa per month for a bandheld remote. On the low end of the scale, Deerborn Heighte residents pay 11 cents. And with MetroVI-don's recent three-cent increase, we pay 21 cents.

Now, here's where we luck out. Premium channels are not regu-lated. In other words, cable opera-tors are free to charge whatever the market hears (or whatever they can get). But MetroVision charges are relatively low fee for HBO. Only Omnicon charges less in Romulus with a rate of \$7.57. We pay \$7.35. And pity the folks
