Roth won the silver medal in the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.1 seconds and the bronze in the 400 relay. Roth was a gold-medal contender in the long jump, but he had to withdraw from the competition after hurting his back.

Roth had only one week to train for the games because he spent most of the summer playing baseball. He was a varsity player at North Farmington High School as a freshman last spring.

He played center field for the North Farmington Hest Bloomfield Mickey Mantle team in the summer. He hit 331, had an on-base percentage of 25 haze.

Farmington Hills Harrison had its football pride wounded Saturday in a season-opening loss to Birmingham Brother Rice at the Silverdome, 28-

The Hawks, the preseason No. 1 team in the state, recovered from a 28-7 deficit with two fourth-quarter touchdowns to make the final score respectable.

Harrison had a chance to tie and force overtime, but Jake Lawon's fourth-down pass to Jaff Aschoff with a little more than three minutes left was incomplete at the Rice 25.

"That made me feel good, the fact we came back and showed some poise," Harrison coach John Herrington said.

"I told the kids we don't have time to feel bad about it, because we have (Westland John) Glenn nost week. It's only the first game and we have a lot of football left."

When Harrison's Jason Granger dashed 78 yards for a touchdown on the first play from scrimmage, the game looked like a possible replay of the 91 opener won by Harrison 32-0. But it was all Rice after that.

The Warriors used the combination of quartarback Derek Canine's passing and tailback Brian Marhall's running to dominate the clock and statistics for three quarters.

Rice outgained the Hawks 282-218 overall, but the margin was 253-109 through three periods. The Warriors scored early in the second half and turned the game into a rout at that stage, 28-7.
