Do you favor the confirmation of the franchise granted by the Village Council on February 6, 1911, to Eastern Michigan Edison Company, granting permission to erect, construct, lay, operate and maintain within the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places within the Village of Farmington, poles, wires, pipes, conduits and other apparatus for the transmission and distribution of electricity for public and private use.

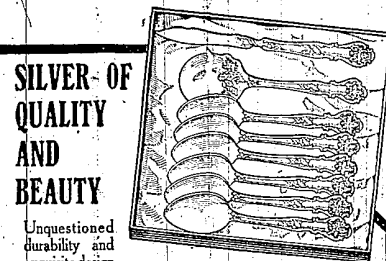
