Land

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The tax is designed to become a revolving fund. The city would buy land and then either convert it to a park or sell it to a develops' with conditions on how it can be used. The money from the sale of city land would then go back into the land acquisition fund.

"We've done it before." Bates said. "But we just don't have the money to do that anymore."

And in the light of some contro-versial projects, such as the re-cently approved Timbercreat de-velopment at 12 Mile and Middle-belt, the money could go a long way to maintain the large lot, res-idential flavor of the city.

But the recent Timbercreat controversy may make the pro-posal harder to sell, not easier. Al-though the city council negotiated an option to buy part of that project and lessen or eliminate any commercial development on it should the land acquisition tar pass, some residents have called the idea blackmail. Ĩ

Councilman Aldo Vagnozzi, who supports the land acquisition tax, said having the proposal linked to any project risks its de-feat.

"I believe in it in principal," Vagnozzi said. "Buit this is closely tied in with the (developer Gary) Jonna (Timbercrast) develop-ment. And I'm opposed to that (option to buy part of the project) because it's overpriced."

The problem will be convincing voters that there is no other way to change zoning. Sever said. Many residents still believe the city can arbitrarily change zoning to an RA-1, or residential use, at its own pleasure.

"Some people think we have that ability to rezone," he said.

Sover added that socing the proposal only in terms of Timber-creat would be shortsighted, since the city has other areas and odd-sized lots the city could buy and thereby protect the character of the surrounding area.

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
