"It still happens, unfortunate-ly," Farmington Public Safety deputy director Mike Wiggins said.

arith culprits are described as two black women, one in her 40s and the other in her 20s, according to police reports. One was driving a 1985 Ford LTD registered to a Detroit address.

The victim told police she met the pair while shopping at Target in Farmington Hills. A woman first approached her and asked if she had dropped a wallet. A sec-

ond woman appeared shortly after, asking what was going on.

The first woman opened the billfold, which appeared to contain cash and a note.

After nixing a suggestion to turn it in at the store, she saked the victim and the other woman to accompany her to NBD, where she said she worked, to make sure the money was not counterfeit.

The woman went into the bank and returned, saying she spoke to Mr. Goldberg, She said the bank manager told her he would need additional cash so he could compare serial numbers.

The second woman offered

\$8,000 she received from an auto insurance claim. Both women then saked the victim if she could get some money.

They drove to a Southfield hank where the victim withdrew the cash. After returning to the Farmington Downtown Center, one of the con artists took the money and went into the bank. She returned to the car and told the victim to go inside and speak with Mr. Goldberg. The victim went inside where a bank employee told her a Mr. Goldberg didn't work at that branch.

When she went outside, the car was gone.
