days of her power, abe held back
the modernization of China. In a famous episade, she appropriated
money meant to provide China
with a modern navy and used it to
build an elaborate stone boat in
the lake on the grounds of her
summer palace in Beijing.

In the years before her death in 1903 her interests changed and she sought the company of West-ern diplomate and officials. This fascinating woman was also a taiented painter.

comes from the grains and luster of the wood and the smooth shapes of the pieces.

Woods used in making the instruments were chosen for their sound as well as their color. Different notes are sounded when the wooden drums are struck in different places. A contra base drum by Gary Damaskos features yellow canary wood with reddial grains. Another by Damaskos, comparatively compact in size, has a purple shade and a sanskrit emblem in the front.

A "gourdolin" by Steven Catania is a mandolin-like inaturment made out of a gourd. They inlaid designs, resembling small smoothakes or flowers, adorn the neckoft his instrument.
