The others ranged from a 24-percent increase. St. Louis with 6,200 single-family permits, to a 4-percent decline, Milonespolis/ St. Paul with 7,500 permits.

For the period April through June, southeastern Michigan builders pulled permits for nearly 6,000 single-family units, a 25-percent increase from the second quarter of last year. percent increase from quarter of last year.

Nationally, the second-quarter increase was 14 percent with 315,000 units permitted.
