Most criminals would like such a choice pay fines, or buy manh-mallows for the boneless. That is the offer given by a judge to two 18-year-old Universi-ty of Michigan students, one from Livenis, the other from Farming-ton Hills.

ion Hills. Blavm Barl Gascheler of Livo-nis and Richard Konneth Gaul of Familyiton Hills had been ticket-ad Oct. 8 by the university's pub-lic asfety department. Their crime? Toesing marsh-maliows during a football game against the Michigan State Uni-versity Soartana.

"The wiser way to handle the marshmallow throwers would be to eject them from the stadium," Connors said. "Problem solved and not at taxpayers" expense." Apparently the university of the Regents' Ordinance that makes flinging objects during a sporting event a misdomeanor punishable by up to 60 days in jail. Sail. Chief Judge Timothy P.
