

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

DRUGS

Farmington Hills police arrested three teens who were illegally on the grounds of Harrison High School in Farmington Hills on Nov. 11. One former student, a Hills youth, 17, and two others, a 17-year-old Hills youth and a Wallied Lake teen, 18, were detained by police. The Wallied Lake teen had marijuana and was arrested. The other two were arrested for being illegally on school grounds.

Farmington Hills police arrested two Hills youths, both 17, for possession of marijuana at the 7-Eleven store on Middlebelt Nov. 5. One of the men was selling at third youth to fight him when police arrived. They found open beer cans and marijuana in a black 1990 Pontiac Sunbird.

Farmington Hills police arrested Las Vegas, Nev., man, 29, for possession of marijuana at 1:50 a.m. Nov. 4 at Grand River and Drake in Farmington Hills. Officers stopped a 1992 red Chevy for a busted left tail light.

The woman's maroon 1994 GMC pickup had been weaving while traveling north after stopping for several seconds at a flashing amber light. She had a blood alcohol level of .18 percent.
