

An explosion of new coffsehouses is transforming the cultural geography of metro Detroit.

Boasting non-alcoholic menus and specious, friendly atmospheres, java houses provide a creative and affordable alternative to bars.

Many are modeled after similar establishments in New York and Seettle, where European-style cafes are an important part of cultural life.

Historically, the coffsehouse has served as a forum for social transfor-mation and artistic expression. Ac-cordingly, most coffsehouses in metro Detroit offer poetry readings, live jaxs, accentic guiter perfor-mances and classical music con-certs.
