Money matters

Raises won't wipe out rainy-day fund

Despite giving 3-pervent raises this year to tachers and administrators. Clarenceville Public Schools atill will have a healthy chunk of money left in the rainy-day fund, asid Superintendent David Kamish.

The pay increases unanimously approved Thuraday by the Clarenceville Board of Education for both groups mean the rainy-day fund will temporarily dip to \$194,000 but should climb back up to \$225,000 by June 1995, Kamish said.

"We have a good cushion," the superintendent said. "We're in very good shape financially."

auto industry still will be doing good. We didn't want to tie the hands of the district that far down the road, and the teachers under-stood that. We got no argument from them."

This year, Clarenceville will get \$6,577 per student from the state.

The trustees Thursday also set its final budget for 1994-95. The budget shows an income of \$12.2 million and expenditures of \$12.1 million.

Some \$9.1 million of the in-come will come from the state; some \$2.3 will come from the local property tax. This major shift in who pays the bills came about be-cause of passage of Proposal A in March.

For example, the term life in-surance policy for the administra-tors will rise to \$75,000 because the policy for teachers has climbed to \$50,000, Kamish said.

Also, the administrators will now get an extra \$20 for every credit hour they hold beyond a master's degree. "This will be in line with the \$25 paid to teach-ers," Kamish said.

Administrators receiving a 3-percent pay increase are Ralph Skrocki, James Lancaster, Cheryl Leach, David Simowaki, Carl Wagmer, Jesse Baker, Ellen Dav-is, Harold Makinen, Rose Govig, James Hylman, Cathy Freshwater and Mary Aytes.

The teachers' old contract ex-pired Aug. 26. They had been working under a two-month ex-tension, which expired Oct. 31.
