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# City: Residency rules needed



The city of Farmington is concerned about how proposed legislation limiting residency require-ments would affect the ability of firefighters to respond quickly.

A bill that would eliminate real-dency requirements for police and fire employees has Farmington city offi-

cials checking their address book in order to write their state legislators. Recently elected state Sen. Dave Honigman, R.West Bloomfield, intro-duced the legislation that would curb

realdency requirements.


A similar bill is in the House. Both are expected to be discussed on the floor when the Legislature reconvenes in 1995.

Farmington council members feel the city's public safety department should be exempt if such a bill becomes law.

At Monday's meeting, the council agreed to send a letter to Honigman and state Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farm-

ington Hills, stating as much.
Farmington requires its public anfaty officers — who do perform both polics and fire duties — to live within a six-mile radius of the city limit, it allows the department to respond quickly to fires, Farmington Public Safety Director Gary Goas said.
"From our standpoint, the real strength in our fireflighting ability is

## 21-year-old man arraigned in Farmington robberies

Wallace Schmidt, 21, of Lincoln Park was arraigned Tuesday in 47th District Court in connection with two Farmington armed robberios. Judge Fred Harris entered a not-

guilty ples on behalf of the defendant.
Harris set a \$25,000 bend for charges in connection with the Nov.
27 armed robbery at Wahing Well
Gifts and a \$15,000 bend for an
unarmed robbery Nov. 29 at Flower
Express.

If convicted in the armed robbery, Schmidt could face life with parole. The unarmed robbery carries a 15-year jail term. The use of a chemical spray in the Flower Express robbery is considered a two-year misdemeanor.

Schmidt faces a preliminary exam before Harris at 8 a.m. Dec. 19 in 47th District Court for both Farmington robberies.
