The store also has a diamond


The store also has a diamond viewing room, where customers can view items in private.

When the cashler opened the register for the sals, the man removed an object from the front waisthand of his slocks. Police identified the object as an overthe counter chemical spraying


He sprayed the chemical at the cashler, squirting har in the face. She screamed, clutching her face and ran out the back door where she was observed by witnesses.
