Fletcher said he "just wanted to go out quietly. It's time to move on and let a younger man take over," he said.

"I had hoped to stay on for a couple more seasons, but I decided about halfway through this season to call it quits. I talked it over with my wife and my assistant coaches.

"There was no duresa. I'm leaving with good feelings about the program and about the kids. Fletcher, the fourth head coach in Southfield football history, compiled a 65-46 record in 12 years. The Blue Jays posted seven winning seasons under Pietcher, including three Southeastern Michigan Association championships and one perfect require season (9-0 in 1990).

Fletcher's Blue Jays qualified for the state playoff tournament twice — 1985 and 1990.


