MDOT engineer Natalie Bekmanis gave an outline of the project, which will be completed in two phases, with construction planned for late 1997.

Bekmanis asid the improvements will include ramp and ther improvements to ease fackups on M-5 (formerly M-102), Grand River at 10 Mile; a

dangerous crossover from Free-dom Road to the Halsted/Grand River Intersection in the first phase.

A second phase would add other improvements, including the addition of another bridge crossing M-5. Bekmanis said some road widening and limiting

the number of driveways that turn onto those main roads will also ease traffic and improve safe-

Since 1989, an EDC M-102/ Grand River Improvement Com-mittee has been meeting with businesses in the area, city, state and federal officials to improve

the intersection.

Costick said that until the demonstration project money became available, the city could not come up with the needed money.

Knollenberg said that thanks in part to the efforts of Congressman Bob Carr, the project qualified under special criteria for funding.
