They performed several uner-pacted surgeries, so the supplice were sometimes limited Glovak sold. "So many things happen that you don't anticipate. It was almost like divine intervention," she said. "We had just enough equipment for every surgery we did."

In addition, Busuito explained the doctors often had to use the hospital's equipment that didn't always work. There were even times when they performed sur-gery by Rashlight. Despite the working conditions, every proce-dure was successful.

"The kids would wake up in the recovery room in severe pain and under anesthesia and still shower us with thanks," said Busulto.

She and Buzulto came back wling grateful themselves after

witnessing the poverty and lack of resources in the town.

"Camargo is a very poor area. In Mexico they have no welfare system so the people provide for themselves any way they can," Busuito said. "Despite this fact they're very proud and grateful for anything you do for them."

"It really makes your problems here seem smaller," he said.

The trip wasn't all work and no play for the team. Busulto gave several lectures to local doctors, and the town's Rotary Club, which sponsored the hotel rooms, threw them numerous Merican fleetas in thanks.

Because the whole experience was so gratifying, Glovak and Busulto hope to travel with Heal-ing the Children to another coun-try, perhaps Quatemals or Lithuania.
