City resident awarded board certification

Michael Kimbarow, a Farmington resident and an employee of the Rehabilitation Institute of Michigan, was recently awarded board certification in Neurologic Communication Disorders in Adults by the Academy of Neurologic Communication Disorders and Sciences (ANCDS).

Board certification is the only program for the recognition of speech-language pathologists who have obtained a high level of expertise in the diagnosis and treatment of people with neurologic communication disorders. Only 119 speech-language pathologists

are so recognized in the United States.

Kimbarow serves Rehabilitation Institute of Michigan as the director of Speech-Language Pathology. He is also an associate professor for the department of physical medicine and rehabilitation at Wayne State University Medical School.
