Her fiancé is a graduate of Birmingham Seaholm High School and Ohio State University. He is employed with Klenzade, a division of Ecotek.



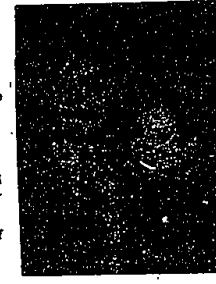
