Canton earns 2nd straight title

All those early morning workouts in the heat of summer paid
dividends for Ted Docks on a cold
night in the dead of winter.

Docks heated up when his team
needed him most, draining three
straight three-pointers in a oneminute span to obliterate a 13point deficit and spark his team
to a 65-53 upset victory over
Westland John Glenn in the
Western Lakes Activities Associsation Tournament final Friday at
Plymouth Salem.

Docks, who rose early last summer to practice shooting threepointers from NBA range, scored
21 of his game-high 25 points in
the pivotal fourth quarter. No

Canton ends its regular season with a 16-4 regular-season record; the WLAA tournament title was its second straight. Glenn is 16-3.
For more than three quarters, it seemed Docks and his Plymouth Canton teammates struggled to

find a way to knock off Glenn, the WLAA's regular-season champions and winners of 11-straight games.

Then in the final quarter, the Chiefs discovered they had the formula with them all along. Their coach, Dan Young, kept telling his team to "quit worrying and just play."

The message sunk in. The defense kept after the Rockets, who committed six turnovers in the final six minutes of the game—half of them unforced errors. By the quarter's midpoint, Canton had trimmed a 52-39 deficit (with 6¼ minutes left) to 52-47.

But then the Chiefs seemed to stall—a grain, as their other comeback efforts had earlier in the game.

That's when Docks took control.

No arguing that. In an offensive flurry that lasted a minute, Docks nailed back-to-back-to-back

triples — the third three-pointer tying the game at 56.

For all intents and purposes, the Rockets were through. With the pressure on, they failed to acore for a 241 span. Their only points in the last 244 came on a meaningless layup by Savon Hubbard with three seconds to

play.

ly on the perimeter and had Rucker clogging the middle, sitering nearly every shot in the paint. Glenn closed then started the second period with a 15-2 run, making it 22-10 with four minutes lieft. John Abrecht's triple in the final seconds gave the Rockets a 7-25 halfilms advantage. Their lead was still 12 until a 3M-minute scoreless stretch mid-way through the third quarter allowed Canton to narrow the aix. Still, Glenn had a 47-30 outhing soing into the final period: two free throws by Hubbard followed by a Tigner triple pushed it to 13 with 6:38 remaining in the game. ing in the game.

That's when the Canton come-back started. Johnson scored a pair of baskets, with Hartke get-ting a third. And then Docks found his range over the Glenn defense; he ended up hitting 4-of-8 three-pointers in the game.
