tom of the flower is slightly speckled. Sometimes the flower color is clear pink, mulberry red (or a blend) or white, according to the book "Annuals for Connoisseurs" by Wayne Winterrowd.

Cold facts

This author suggests that seeds need winter cold to germinate and should be sown in
place in moist or well-watered friable garden
soil in the garden or in a nursery. Chilling in
the refrigerator for a month will work also,
then sow on starile compost. Able to endure
some frost, the plant will grow quickly when
warm weather begins. Thinning is recommended. Fertilizing usually lant necessary.
