Chargers perform well in state meet

Livonia Churchill finished in a tie for 22nd at Saturday's Class A state swim finals in East Lansing, ending a season which included an 8-2 overall dual meet record and 5-0 mark in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

"It was a great way to end the season," Stark said. "Coming into the meet, I wanted to do as well as possible and finish in the top 12 of a couple events, but I didn't think we'd finish as high as we did."

It was the first time the Chargers had placed in the finals during Stark's six years as coach. Churchill tied Ferndale for 22nd place with 19 points. Birmingham Brother Rice swam away with the title (221 points).

The star for Churchill was senior Jon Carlson. After suffering through his junior year with mononucleosis, the senior ended his career with career-best times in the 200-yard freestyle (1:43.64) and in the 500 freestyle (4:41.31).

Carlson's time in the 200 freestyle placed him sixth making him an all-star. He finished 9th in the 500 freestyle.

"I think the mono gave him the extra drive to do well this year," Stark said. "He's a hard worker and always looking for a new challenge in practice."

Carlson is considering offers to swim next year at Indiana, Pennsylvania, Eastern Michigan and Oakland.

Junior Mark Campbell also had a strong showing, finishing eighth in the 22 freestyle with a career-best time of 1:44.17. He finished 15th in the event in 1994. Junior Rob Grant took 16th in the 200 individual medley.

Livonia Franklin's Randy Cobb finished seventh in the 11 breaststroke with a time of 1:00.08 — less than a second shy of capturing all-state honors.

Mustangs keep regional streak alive

The tournament had barely started and already the Mustangs were facing elimination.

Birmingham Marian opened play in the Class A regional volleyball tournament Saturday at Birmingham Seaholm with an 11-15 loss to hard-hitting Walled Lake Central. In a best-of-three series, that's not an ideal way to begin the day. Mustangs coach Patty Kopmeyer was concerned, but not worried.

"The one thing I have noticed about this team is that they don't get frazzled," Kopmeyer said. "They keep even keel even if they're behind. They don't get excited, and they always play as a team."

The Mustangs did just that. Behind stellar defense and flawless serving, Marian bounced back to win the next two games over Central, 15-2, 15-3, then turned back Lake Orion in the championship match, 15-9, 15-7. The Dragons advanced to the finals by defeating Lakeland 15-4,

14-16, 15-7 in the other semifinal. It was the third regional championship in a row for the Mustangs, who improved to 31-9-3 on the year. They'll meet top-ranked Portage Northern 4 p.m. Friday in the state quarterfinals at Portage Central High School. The Huskies are the three-time defending Class A state champions.

"We played Portage earlier in the year in the Grand Blanc tournament and lost to them 16-14, 15-8," explained Kopmeyer. "We lost to them last year in the quarterfinals 15-8, 15-7. I think we know how to play them. They're a great team, we just have to get ready for them."

Following their wake-up call in the opener against Central, Marian was ready for anything. Behind the serving of senior Carina Carlesimo (four points and two aces) and the strong net play of seniors Julie Storn and Alya

Bussey with two kills each, the Mustangs stormed out to a 7-0 lead in the second game and never looked back. They led 9-0 in the third game before the Vikings finally found the scoring column. Junior Candice Ide had a pair of aces in serving for Marian's first five points.

Lake Orion jumped out to a 7-2 lead in the first game of the championship match before Bussey took over for the Mustangs. The 6-foot-9 outside hitter registered five kills and a block as Marian stormed back for a 15-9 victory. Bussey and Carlesimo contributed four kills each in the championship game as the Mustangs led 8-3 and 12-6 before sealing the victory. Heather Greig finished with 27 aces.

"We needed to take charge and come together as a team, and get it done," said Bussey of her team's rally after the opening loss. "As long as we pass the ball, our hitting will come. We're playing really, really well right now as a team."

The loss was disappointing for

coach Mike Lindstrom and the Vikings, who set a school record for wins in a season with a 41-12 overall record.

"(Marian) adjusted to us real well," Lindstrom said. "They picked up on what we were doing and we stopped moving. They went off-speed on us a lot and kept building on it. They're an extremely good defensive team, and they were very patient. They picked at us until they got some momentum."

Junior Jessica Regentin and sophomore Becky Cummings led Central with 10 kills and three blocks each. Senior Heather Miller also played well, finishing with five kills, six digs and three aces.

Central will lose just four seniors — Miller, Kathy Rabaut, Trisha Wilfang and Michelle Martin — to graduation.

"We're still kind of a young team and have a lot of kids coming back," added Lindstrom. "This was a season of high expectations, and we realized a lot of our goals."

Teeters has Blazers in familiar place

Tom Teeters is no stranger to the state volleyball finals.

The Livonia Ladywood coach is making his sixth trip to the Blazers (38-8 overall). They meet Davison (35-5-4) in a state Class A quarterfinal match beginning at 7 p.m. Friday at Portage Central High School.

At Livonia, Clarenceville, Teeters made three trips to the big dance, coming away with one state crown and one second-place finish.

At Ladywood, Teeters is gunning for his third state title. He also has one runner-up trophy.

"If we play like we did versus Plymouth (Salem) we could be in the finals," said Teeters, whose team ousted the Rocks and Farmington Hills Mercy last week en route to the regional title. "I look ahead and I like our draw. It couldn't be any better."

State heavyweights Portage Central (79-0) and Temperance Bedford (77-6-1), the No. 1 and 2

ranked teams all season long, are on the opposite side of bracket.

The Ladywood-Davison quarterfinal winner meets the Port Huron Northern-Groveland-Pigeon North quarterfinal survivor in a semifinal match 11:30 a.m. Saturday at Portage Central.

The state championship is set for 6:30 p.m. Saturday at Kalamazoo Central.

Ladywood has lost all three meetings against Bedford. The only other time the Blazers faced among the quarterfinal field is Catholic League foe Birmingham Marian.

Teeters was able to scout Davison, which ousted Midland (coached by former Bentley player Angie Porter) in last Saturday's regional finals at Midland Dow.

"Their two middle hitters are their big guns," Teeters said. "We have to keep the ball out of their middle. We have to control where

they hit from and where they hit to.

"A weakness is they have a serving consistency, and serve reception. The key is our serves versus their serve reception."

Erin LeSage, a 6-foot-9 junior, who has emerged as an all-around player for the Blazers, is a top serving threat along with 6-4 senior Anne Poglia, 5-5 senior Debbie Sobczak and 5-3 senior Christie Soter.

"Erin's a spin serve," Teeters said. "She put it pre-spin on the ball and adds to it. It also curves. Our serving is stronger than any team I've had. We figure it's

an area where you can get six or seven points a match. It's an area that can have the most impact, but it's the least time spent on."


"We average 50 serves per day, which is not a whole lot."

Teeters also is pleased with his team's back-row hitting and depth.

"We use 11 people in our rotation," he said. "It's the most we've used at Ladywood."

"And we're a different team this year because we run both setters (Renee Rozell and LeSage) next to each other instead of playing opposite."

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CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN NOTICE TO CUT WEEDS

It shall be the duty of all owners of subdivided land within any platted subdivision, and of the owners of all land located within an area of one hundred (100) feet or less from a platted subdivision, and of the owners of all land within one hundred (100) feet of any major roads within the boundaries of the City of Farmington Hills to keep all noxious vegetation or lawn grass growth to a maximum height of no more than eight (8) inches above ground level, or a level which presents a lower bearing state, whichever level is less. Noxious vegetation and lawn grass growth not appropriately cut by June 1, 1978, and thereafter for the remainder of the year may be cut by the City, and the owner will be charged with the expense and costs of each cut as provided in Article II Section 17-29 of the Farmington Hills City Code. This may be done as many times as is necessary during the growing season. In addition to the above costs assessed pursuant to Article II Sections 17-24 through 17-31 for each cutting of noxious vegetation or lawn grass growth by the City or its agents, any owner who has retained or otherwise failed to cut noxious vegetation or lawn grass growth as provided for in Article II Sections 17-24 through 17-31 shall, upon a finding of guilt, be subject to a civil fine of not more than Five Hundred and No/100 (\$500.00) Dollars and/or ninety (90) days in the county jail, together with the costs of prosecution which shall include actual attorney fees incurred by the City. The term "noxious vegetation" means those plants described in Section II of Act No. 359 of the Public Act of Michigan of 1941 (MCL 247.62; MSA 9.821 (2)), as amended, and all types and varieties of wild grass and weeds which exceed the height of eight (8) inches above ground level.
