Eclectic electric

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The second annual "Eclectic Electric" exhibit at Gallery: FunctionArt, 23-B W. Lawrence in Pontiac (call (810) 333-0333), helps you see the light in an exciting way. Works in the display, continuing through March 29, feature electricity. The pieces seem to be wired with imagination. Even the relatively "simple" works have a special style.

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A tabletop lamp by Mark Beres features a tight arrangement of string, like a "cat's cradle" that had slightly slipped, over a steel body. The piece has a symmetry with its asymmetry; that is, the design in each segment ian't symmetric, but put together, they balance.

Gonzale Rodriguez works with whimsy in his tiny lamps. Brass, glass and paper make "Tricicleo," which looks like a wheeled vehicle. His "Luna" of our period of the string lamps are stringly light and specific proper, plastic and glass suggests the moon with its crescent-shaped sides. 




