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A talented group of seniors and a strong sprint corps cause Farmington Hills Harrison coach Mark Babcock to be optimistic about the 1995 girls track season.

"It may be one of the better (senior classes) we've ever had," Babcock said. "For that reason alone, I feel good about the way things could go for us."

The Hawks have seven seniors, six of whom have been with the program since they were freshmen.

Snow still managed to be third-team all-area in the long jump and finish sixth in Oakland County in the 100-meter hurdles.

"Obviously, a key for us is to have bree healthy." Babcock said. "She's been a near-miss in the regional a couple times, so that's one thing she wants to get past and go to the state meet. She's a good leader, and we're counting on her quite a bit."

Noe is an outstanding distance runner and two-time state placer in cross country and a state qualifier in track.

"We're looking for her to have her best track season," Babcock said. "She worked hard in the off-season and is going in the right direction.
