Coach irv Horwitz is more optimatic about his North Farmington base-bill itesm's chances for success than be has since 1992.

The Raiders won the Western Lakes Activities Association that year, but Horwitz isn't going quite that far in his assessment.

But he does believe North can do better than its 6-14 record and 6-11 finish in the WI.AA last season.

"I think this team is capable of competing with teams in the league," Horwitz said. "I'm not asying we're going to win the league, but we're not going to be the pushovers we were the last couple years.

"I think these guys are confident and, if we have a good start, I think we can surprise a bunch of people."

The Raiders return seven players, including senior tri-captains Darrin

Glasser, Mark Lee and Jeff Light.
Glasser and Lee will do most of the pitching again and also play a field position.
Glasser was 2-7 with a 2.10 earned-run average but deserved a better fate, according to Horwitz, who thinks Glasser will pitch next year at Princeton or Harvard.
"We've never had a good team runder him, but he's a greet left-handed pitcher and an intelligent young man," Horwitz said, "It think he can play in the lay League, and he's smart enough to go there."
Glasser throws a good fasthall, curve and changeup, according to Horwitz, and will be the main starter.
Lee also has two years of varsity experience and was 2-3 last year. He

will be the regular shortstop, and Horwitz hopes he can rebound from a hitting slump. Glasser will play either first base or the outfield when not pitching.
