1. Proposed Amendment to remove the present restriction against the adoption of a Graduated Income Tax.
2. Referendum on Act 6 of the Public Acts of 1967 (Daylight Savings Time).
3. Referendum on Act 76 of the Public Acts of 1968 (Proposal relating to Bonding to Abate Water Pollution).
4. Referendum on Act 257 of the Public Acts of 1968 (Proposal relating to Bonding for Public Recreational Purposes).
5. Proposed Amendment to permit the Election of Members of the Legislature during their term of office to another State Office.

NOTICE RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS
ELECTION LAW, ACT 116, P.A. 1954

SECTION 720. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continuously open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a.m. and will remain open until 8 o'clock p.m. of said day of election.

Harry Wingerter, president of the Board of Commerce, said that the revision was set up to better meet the needs of the members.





The UN Is No Mystery To Eagle 6th Graders

Gerald Morawski's sixth grade class at Eagle School probably knows more about the United Nations than most adults. The children have been studying the United Nations for days. On Tuesday, they put all their information together to hold a "United Nations in Action" program.

Each of the 27 boys and girls in the class was dressed in the costume of a UN-member country.

THIS MADE 27 different costumes and some were highly original, like that of John Stokes, who was resplendent in a tinfoil cap of an Egyptian pharaoh and aqua-colored window-curtain toga.

The day-long event was accompanied musically by ethnic records, playing softly on a side table. It was also accompanied by a myriad of displays, ranging from foreign coins to picture diagrams of the UN.

The paper flags on the walls had to vie with the youngsters' costumes to be seen. Color was everywhere.

THE RED-SKIRTED, man-tilla-clad Mexican delegate Barbara Taylor held forth on the UN with a measured selection of facts a grown-up could use:

"The UN helps new countries to get organized and helps them to have better education and schools for their children. It provides tools and better ways of farming and helps countries to better understand each other."

Barbara also had an opinion on Vietnam: "It's not really our war; we shouldn't be in there. But I think the UN should be."

BARBARA isn't Mexican, but some of the pupils chose to be delegates of nations from which their forebears came, and the class is almost a UN in itself.

Mark Filippelli naturally chose to be the Italian delegate; Alton Wright, born in England, represented Great Britain; Mark Nayback, born in Finland, was Finnish delegate; and Robert Miller, a Jewish lad, was an Israeli.

Robert is strong for the UN because "when Israel became a country in 1948 and the other countries rushed to attack her, the UN saved her."


He was equipped with photo-stats of 1948 newspapers to prove his point.

MARK BRADLEY was of two minds about his chosen country, Russia.

"I like Russia," he said with no apologies. "It's big and it's powerful."

It could be that Mark was swayed by Russia's recent invasion of Czechoslovakia. The newspaper coverage gave him a lot of material for his notebook and when really pinned down, he didn't approve of Russia very much.

"The UN should have told Russia to pull out. Russia should cooperate more with the UN," said the pro-American-Russian delegate.
