

Youth, Parents Both Take Part In YM Sex Ed

Dates have been set for Farmington Area YMCA's three-session sex education series.

The program is structured for junior high school students and their parents and features Dr. Edwin Blumberg, Farmington physician, and the Rev. Carl F. Kallreider, pastor of Antioch Lutheran Church, as resource persons.

The program will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. on successive Thursdays, Nov. 7, Nov. 14 and Nov. 21, in Farmington Junior High School, 3300 Thomas, Farmington.

Each segment is followed by an informal discussion period on how parents can better communicate and interpret the information provided by the resource persons.

The program's four objectives are to promote a closer more comfortable relationship between parents and their

children, to achieve a better understanding of the human body and all its processes, to learn of the physiological changes that boys and girls undergo during adolescence and to provide a clearer understanding of sex and reproduction.

BECAUSE of the nature of the subject matter, registration for the series is limited. Boys and girls must be accompanied by a parent. For maximum benefit, attendance at the first two sessions is urged. YNCA membership is not required to attend, but a \$4 registration fee is requested to cover the program expenses.

The new restaurant, located on Farmington Road north of Eight Mile, will seat 150 people and will be open from 7 a.m. to 1 a.m. weekdays and 7 a.m. to 2 a.m. weekends, Bashara said.

City of Farmington Building Department officials valued the building at \$155,000. Forty to fifty persons will be employed in the restaurant, Bashara said. Car service is not planned, according to the owner.
