B V.O. Bates, Herwey Chepmen and Paul Calkins won seats on the Farmington City Council in the Spring Election. Bates, the copy tota-grater with 480, was the coly incumbent winner, having been appointed to council two months earlier. Some 49 percent of Farmington's registered voters went to the polis.

B In the Farmington Township election, all Republican candidates — including clark Harry McCarcken and treasurer Clayton Gozza — were elected by large margine. The township terrnout was light — only 23.8 percent.

Larkshire recognized as model

Larkahire Elementary School in the Farmington District was recognized at the North Central Association of College and Schools' annual meeting in Chicago March 25-29 zo one of 35 schools in Michigan to complete NCA's most demanding school improvement model.

Larkshire has been accredited since the 1989-90 school year. In 1990, the staff at the Farmington Hills school decid-

ed to use this more intensive evaluation model to help max-imize student learning.

The model is different from traditional accreditation in that the school takes on the continuous improvement in selected areas. Larkshire is focusing on writing decision making and student responsibility.

After steering committee chair Geraldine Hinzman and the rest of the staff have started

a series of initiatives, students improved in those areas.
A team of educators headed by Laurie Bissell of Chelsea Public Schools visited Larkshire several times during the last five years to ovaluate the school. Larkshire has completed all eight phases and passed reviews by the elected Michigan NCA State Committee and a panel of school improvement experts from around the nation.



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
