Workout For Hope, a benefit health and fitness event, will run 9 a.m. to noon, Saturday, April 8, at the Orchard Lake campus of Oakland Community College, 27055 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills.

Workout For Hope began seven years ago in San Francisco as a fund raiser to support AIDS research at the City of Hope National Medical Center and Beckman Research Institute in Duarte, Calif. The event now includes 80 cities.

Participants obtain pledges and donations before the event, then work out from one to three hours on event day with top fitness instructors in their community. A minimum of \$50 is required to participate. MasterCard and VISA will be accepted for pay-

ment of pledges at the event.

Workout For Hope features the latest in fitness styles and routines. You don't need to be an Olympic-bound athlete to participate because each event is as easy or challenging as desired. There are no endurance tests or records to beat — everyone can work out at their own pace.

In 1994, \$1.4 million was raised by 17,000 physical fitness enthusiasts across the country. Workout For Hope has raised \$7 million for the advancement of research and treatment at City of Hope. The results of this research ultimately affect people throughout the world as City of Hope shares knowledge and new treatments with the medical community.

The City of Hope National Medical Center and Beckman Research Institute is renowned for treatment and research to combat leukemia and other forms of cancer, diabetes and HIV/AIDS. While 90 percent of all City of Hope patients are treated for some type of malignant disease, seven research continuities to address Alzheimer's disease and a number of genetic and hereditary disorders.
